## From the Treasurer: 'Self-Support'

In the end, it's all about self-support. Since we rarely see this in its entirety, the long-form of Tradition 7 is worth quoting in full:

The AA groups themselves ought to be fully supported by the voluntary contributions of their own members. We think that each group should soon achieve this ideal; that any public solicitation of funds using the name of Alcoholics Anonymous is highly dangerous, whether by groups, clubs, hospitals, or other outside agencies; that acceptance of large gifts from any source, or of contributions carrying any obligation whatever, is unwise. Then, too, we view with much concern those A.A. treasuries which continue, beyond

prudent reserves, to accumulate funds for no stated A.A. purpose. Experience has often warned us that nothing can so surely destroy our spiritual heritage as futile disputes over property, money, and authority. (From, *The AA Service Manual*, pp. S13-S14.)

This really says it all. Tradition 7 seeks to protect us from excess and from dependence. Put another way, it suggests prudence and self-reliance. Important in this are open and transparent financial management practices subject to the will of the group as expressed in the group conscience.

Hopefully you can see echoes of the articles we've been running since February—a recap of that month's treasurer's workshop—in these words from Tradition 7. I'm gratified that several of you have let me know you've found this stuff useful. (The only item we have not covered is taxes, since most groups will never handle the level of funds where accounting to the IRS and State will be required.)

Please let me know if I may be of any direct assistance with any finance-related group questions. Also a reminder, groups contributing to Nassau Intergroup should be receiving fairly prompt acknowledgments. If not, I may not have your group correctly identified (try to include your group's NIG#, found in small print to the right of your group's listing in the meeting list, on all contributions) or may have an incorrect return address. (I use the address your group has listed with us for mailings unless you have expressly told me otherwise.)

Hope this is helpful.

- Other AA Resources Links to other AA websites are provided.
